

A visit to Wade House takes you back to the 1860s – an era of stagecoach travel, the westward expansion of America, and the Civil War. Here you will discover the stately inn, an authentic blacksmith shop, and a sawmill that produced the lumber to help build a growing community. At the Wesley Jung Carriage Museum, explore one of the country's most extensive collections of horse-drawn carriages. The site is open daily, mid-May through mid-October, with special events throughout the year. Enjoy lunch in the Greenbush Cupboard café and browse the broad selection of treasures in the Gift Store.

Built in 1850 by Yankee settlers Sylvanus and Betsy Wade, the 27-room stagecoach inn is the centerpiece of the Wade House experience. Stately and distinguished, Wade House was a welcome respite for weary travelers along the busy plank road between Sheboygan and Fond du Lac.

Return to the time of stagecoach travel and see a community where Yankee refinement met the Wisconsin wilderness.



Wade House hosts a variety of special events and programs throughout the year. Civil War Weekend is an exciting two-day experience in September that includes battle re-enactments, period music, and immersion into life during the Civil War.
